


Construction material	Mudbrick
Number of burials	At least 3 in the shaft (one woman called Ta-sheryt-... [1 st century AD] and two mummy masks of the Antonine period [150-170 AD])
Number of floors	2
Number of rooms	4 (1 st and 2 nd floor)
Number of niches	None
Decoration	Entrance room, north wall: imitation of alabaster slabs (orthostates), djed pillars and tiet signs (lower register), mourning women (upper register) and two jackals (framing the window); west wall: imitation of alabaster slabs (orthostates), procession of gods (lower register), purification of the deceased, procession of gods and priest (upper register); east wall: imitation of alabaster slabs (orthostates), procession of gods (lower register), presentation of the deceased, offering table, and priest (upper register); south wall: imitation of alabaster slabs (orthostates), four male gods (lower register), and gods adoring the scarab (upper register). Shaft room, north wall: imitation of palace façade (orthostates), four goddesses (main register); west wall: imitation of palace façade (orthostates), goddess Nut with mummy and gods (main register); east wall: imitation of palace façade (orthostates), illustration of Book of the Dead 15 (main register); south wall: imitation of palace façade (orthostates), laying-out of the mummy and gods (main register).
